When he goes to the World Museum, he studies the drawers full of stuffed animals until he finds the ones that he recognises from the farm. This year especially, Owen became very interested in water voles when a group of scientists arrived at Church Farm to monitor if they were in the ditches and the Gowy. This then inspired him to read a book called, "The River Singers" which is about water voles.
